Mandatory Recyclable Material Bylaw Amendment


- Mandatory Recyclable Materials Bylaw No. 2743 is a ban on certain materials from being landfilled
- A key waste reduction strategy identified in the TNRD's 2018 Regional Solid Waste Management Plan, section 3.1, sub. 2.
- Authorized through BC's Environmental Management Act



 Disposal Bans are an effective waste reduction tools used in many BC regional districts: Central Okanagan, Metro Vancouver, Fraser-Fort George et al.

- Will assist in bringing the TNRD per capita waste generation rate closer to BC's average
 - TNRD 671kg/person/year
 - BC Average 499kg/person/year
 - BC Target 350kg/person/year

The Region of BC's Best

- The TNRD Board of Directors approved this bylaw in 2021 and staff implemented it over three phases in 2022
- The first recyclable material featured in this bylaw was Old Corrugated Cardboard (OCC) as it is easily recyclable and is commonly found in loads of refuse
- Industrial, Commercial and Institutional (IC&I) sources were the focus of the bylaw as those sources produce ~40% of the waste stream and their loads of refuse are known to contain significant amounts of OCC



- This bylaw applies at all disposal facilities in the TNRD, including City of Kamloops disposal facilities and private landfills
- Enforced by a TNRD bylaw officer assigned specifically to this initiative
- To date 1,101 inspections have occurred, 59 warnings have been issued and 9 tickets have been issued. Compliance rate of 94%
- The proposed amendment bans the disposal of Residential Packaging & Printed Paper as well as BC's Product Stewardship materials, both defined as regulated packaging and products in BC's Recycling Regulation.
- These materials are easily recyclable, take back programs exist throughout the region and residents are paying advanced handling fees for these programs

Regulated Packaging and Products in BC's Recycling Regulation

- In British Columbia, Product Stewardship is an environmental policy approach where the producer's are responsible for the lifecycle of the product
- To meet the requirements of Product Stewardship, producers form non-profit organizations called stewardship agencies or producer responsibility organizations.
- These organizations take responsibility for the end-of-life management of certain materials as well as the reporting and consultation aspects of Product Stewardship.
- These organizations also work with local government and business to provide take back programs for their products

Regulated Packaging and Products in BC's Recycling Regulation

- antifreeze and antifreeze containers
- batteries, including lead-acid batteries
- flammable liquids and solvents
- fluorescent lights
- gasoline and diesel
- pharmaceutical products and medications
- refundable beverage containers
- residential packaging and printed paper

- residential pesticide products
- oil, oil filters and oil containers
- paint and paint containers
- electronics and electrical products including metal household or commercial appliances
- thermostats
- tires
- *propane tanks
- *mattresses/box springs



^{*}To be added to the Recycling Reg in 2024



- Enforceable within all regional solid waste management facilities including City of Kamloops and private landfills
- Will not be enforced by the TNRD at the curbside or alleyway
- Applies to all loads of refuse that contain Product Stewardship materials
- Collector/hauler responsible for the contents of loads that are brought to facilities for disposal

- OCC recyclable paper-based packaging that consists of an inner fluting with a wave-length shape and one or two outer liners
- Residential Packaging and Printed Paper packaging such as cocomingled metal and plastic containers, recyclable OCC, mixed waste paper and other materials approved for regional recyclables collection systems
- Product Stewardship materials recyclables defined as regulated packaging and products in BC's Recycling Regulation.



- Bylaw enforcement officers will continue to conduct visual assessments of loads of refuse
 - Assessment of Residential Packaging and Printed Paper as well as Refundable Beverage Containers will be volume based – not to exceed 10% in a load of refuse
 - Assessment of Product Stewardship materials will be per unit based

Phase 1 (Nov – Dec 2023)

- Outreach Efforts Commence
- Educational Resources Distributed
- No Enforcement and No Fines



Phase 2 (Jan - Feb 2024)

- Ongoing Communication & Education
- Mock Ticketing & Inspections Commence. No Fines
- Administration of Warnings



March 2024 Onward

- Ongoing Communication & Education
- Transition to Full Bylaw Implementation
- Administration of Violations
 - Violation entered into TNRD records
 - Violation package assembled and mailed to offender (Ticket, Scale Ticket, Photos, Letter)
 - 30 Days to pay or file a dispute
 - 60 Days and no payment or file to dispute then referred to Collections Agency
- Enforcement will be Determined by Compliance Rates on a Site-by-Site Basis

B.C. is now expanding the categories of products in the EPR initiative to include:

- Hybrid and electric vehicle batteries and other battery types.
- Mattresses and foundations.
- Compressed canisters, such as single-use camping fuel and fire extinguishers.
- Medical sharps used by people at home.
- Emerging electronics and more moderately hazardous products by clarifying product categories
